Looking ahead, we will continue to explore opportunities to consolidate and streamline City operations so that we can better serve our community. With the budget now in place, Plymouth is ready to focus on new ways to grow and build for the future.

Halloween History and Fun Facts







The history of Halloween begins with the history of a Celtic holiday called "Samhain", a celebration on the last day of the Celtic calendar, October 31st, when the lines between the worlds of the living and dead were believed to blur. When the Roman Empire conquered the Celtic territory, they combined two of their own festivals with Samhain-"Feralia" and a celebration to honor Pomona, a Roman goddess whose symbol is the apple. The celebration of Pomona is most likely why apple-bobbing has become a traditional part of our modern Halloween celebrations.

Around the year 1000, Pope Gregory III changed "All Martyrs Day" to "All Saints Day", and the date of the celebration to November 1st. The day before "All Saints Day" was then called "All Hallows' Even", and later "All Hallows Eve", then "Hallowe'en", and eventually "Halloween". Earlier mentioned Roman-Celtic festival traditions are found in the heart of "Halloween".



Here are a few tips to help you prepare for Power outages

- Check your lanterns for batteries and find your candles as light sources
- Service your generator and make sure it is full of gas. Check that you have a gas can full of gas
- Heavy duty extension cords are needed for generators
- Have enough bottled water to last a few days
- Stock up on blankets and sleeping bags
- Make a master call list of family, friends and neighbors in & out of town to check in on
- Coordinate with neighbors that have generators
- Water heaters have gallons of stored water that can be used.

Halloween found its way to America around the mid-19th century, more commonly in the southern colonies. In the second half of the century new immigrants, namely the Irish, helped popularize the celebration nationally. Many customs meshed into Americas own version of Halloween. In the late 1800's America molded its Halloween celebration into a more community-focused holiday about neighborly get-togethers. In the 1950's, the tradition began to become more kidcentered and celebrations were moved mostly to classrooms and households to accommodate the "baby-boom". Trick-ortreating was revived around this time as well and was seen as a relatively inexpensive way for communities to share the celebration. and protect their homes from mischief. Now, Halloween is celebrated with parties, costumes, storytelling, trick or treating, crafts and many more traditions collected from its long history!



AMADOR COUNTY & COMMUNITY PARTNERS WILL BRING SEVERAL 40-CUBIC YARD BINS TO COLLECT THE FOLLOWING:

- Yard Trimmings & Green Waste (pine needles, leaves, branches, bushes, manzanita, etc.)
- Tree trunks- must not be longer than 2 ft. tall and 2 ft. in diameter (no branches attached & must be separated from other materials).

This will be strictly enforced. This material will be deposited in a 20 yd bin.

- No bags greens must be removed from bags before disposal into containers.
- Metal, car batteries, appliances (except items with freon).

We will not be accepting trash or refrigerator-freezers at this event. Only the items listed above.
