PROCLAMATION DECLARING NOVEMBER AS NATIONAL AMERICAN INDIAN HERITAGE MONTH

WHEREAS, November is nationally recognized as National American Indian Heritage Month and the City of Plymouth would like to recognize how our history and culture of our great nation has been significantly influenced by Native Americans and indigenous peoples; and

WHEREAS, both law and proclamation recognized the American Indians as the first inhabitants of the lands that now constitute the United States as well as making mention of their contributions to American society; and

WHEREAS, in 1990, Congress passed Public Law 101-343, which authorized and requested the President to issue a proclamation designating the month of November 1990 as "National American Indian Heritage" Month. Public Notice of Preparation of an Environmental Impact Report and Public Scoping Meeting

Dear Interested Parties,

As required by the California Environmental Quality Act, the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) Region 2 is providing public notice of the preparation of an Environmental Impact Report (SCH# 2025101571) for Pacific Gas and Electric Company's (PG&E's) Long-Term North Central Region Incidental Take Permit (ITP) and Master Streambed Alteration Agreement (MSAA) for operations and maintenance activities.

Project Location: The following counties or portions of these counties as noted in parentheses are included in CDFW's North Central Region: Amador, Butte, Calaveras, Colusa, El Dorado, Glenn, Lake, Nevada, Placer, Plumas, Sacramento (east of Interstate (I)-5), Sierra, Sutter, Yolo (north of I-80), and Yuba counties. The CDFW's North Central Region boundary is split with the Bay Delta Region, in Sacramento and Yolo County. The boundary follows I-5 starting at Stanislaus County/I-5 junction to the Legal Delta boundary north of I-80. Only portions of the following counties are included because the Permit Area aligns with PG&E's Multiple Region O&M Habitat Conservation Plan boundary: Plumas, Sierra, Nevada, Placer, and El Dorado.

Description of Project: The Proposed Project involves PG&E's Operation & Maintenance activities within CDFW Region 2, which encompasses approximately 35,000 miles of combined natural gas and electric facilities. The gas transmission system consists of gas distribution pipelines and ROWs extending from 5 feet to 150 feet wide. The electric transmission system consists of transmission lines supported by lattice towers or poles, substations, and ROWs that vary in width. The proposed Covered O&M Activities include specific outlined O&M activities for both natural gas and electric facilities. The purpose of the Notice of Preparation (NOP) is to inform recipients that CDFW is beginning the preparation of the Draft Environmental Impact Report and to solicit comments concerning the scope and content of the environmental review. 

A. Introduction

In accordance with Section 15168 of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) Guidelines, the CDFW, as the CEQA lead agency, will prepare an EIR for the issuance of an ITP and MSAA for the continued operations and maintenance (O&M) of specific covered activities (Covered O&M Activities) for PG&E's natural gas and electric facilities in CDFW's North Central Region of California, excluding San Joaquin County. The Covered O&M Activities will occur in the following counties or portions of these counties as noted in parentheses: Amador, Butte, Calaveras, Colusa, El Dorado, Glenn, Lake, Nevada, Placer, Plumas, Sacramento (east of Interstate (I)-5), Sierra, Sutter, Yolo (north of I-80), and Yuba. The CDFW's North Central Region boundary is split with the Bay Delta Region in Sacramento and Yolo counties. The boundary follows I-5 starting at the Stanislaus County/I-5 junction to the Legal Delta boundary north of I-80. The MSAA portion of the Proposed Project is related to development of a long-term agreement with PG&E to ensure compliance with Title 20, Section 1602 of the California Code of Regulations (CCR) for those jurisdictional areas within CDFW's North Central Region where PG&E performs certain O&M activities. The Proposed Project applicant, PG&E, has filed an application with the CDFW for an ITP under California Fish & Game Code § 2081 (b); CCR, Title 14, §§ 783.2-783.8 to authorize potential take of giant garter snake (*Thamnophis gigas*), California tiger salamander (Ambystoma californiense) Central California Distinct Population Segment (DPS), foothill yellow-legged frog (Rana boylii) Feather River DPS, foothill yellowlegged frog North Sierra DPS, and foothill yellow-legged frog South Sierra DPS. PG&E is not seeking take coverage in San Joaquin County under this ITP because take coverage for giant garter snake and other covered species is already provided for San Joaquin County under a separate ITP

(No. 2081-2008-001-00). The CDFW is serving as the lead agency in preparing an EIR and meeting obligations required under its certified regulatory program in compliance with CEQA for the issuance of the ITP and MSAA.

As required by CEQA, this NOP is being sent to the California Governor's Office of Land Use and Climate Innovation, responsible and trustee agencies, members of the public, and interested parties who submitted a request for such notices. The purpose of the NOP is to inform recipients that the CDFW is beginning preparation of a Draft EIR for the Proposed Project and to solicit comments concerning the scope and content of the environmental information, including information relevant to an agency's statutory responsibilities in connection with the Proposed Project. Information that would be most useful at this time includes descriptions of the significant environmental issues, reasonable alternatives, and mitigation measures recommended to be explored further in the Draft EIR.

This NOP includes background information on the Proposed Project and the area under consideration for the ITP and MSAA (the Permit Area) (Section B), a description of the Proposed Project (Section C), a summary of potential project impacts (Section D), day and time of the virtual public scoping meeting (Section E), information on how to provide comments to the CDFW (Section F), and where documents are available for public review (Section G).

In accordance with CEQA Guidelines Section 15082(b), there will be a 30-day comment period for this NOP beginning on **October 31, 2025** and ending on **November 30, 2025**. The CDFW welcomes agency and public input during the public review period. In the event that no response or well-justified request for additional time is received from any responsible, federal, or trustee agency by the end of the review period, the CDFW may presume that such agencies have no comments.

B. Background and Project Location

B.1 Background

PG&E operates a comprehensive network of approximately 10,500 miles of gas transmission and distribution pipelines, 24,800 miles of electric transmission and distribution lines, and 175 substations within CDFW's North Central Region, encompassing Amador, Butte, Calaveras, Colusa, El Dorado, Glenn, Lake, Nevada, Placer, Plumas, Sacramento (east of I-5), San Joaquin, Sierra, Sutter, Yolo (north of I-80), and Yuba counties or portions of the counties. This network was primarily established between the 1950s and 1970s, well before the establishment of the California Endangered Species Act (CESA) and the Federal Endangered Species Act, which were enacted in 1970 and 1973, respectively, and continues to evolve and expand as needed to meet customer needs.

In addition to other relevant laws and regulations, operations and maintenance of the gas and electric system are regulated by the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC). Maintenance and repair of the natural gas system is required by the CPUC General Order 112-F, which incurporates the United States (U.S.) Department of Transportation regulations provided by Title 49, Part 192 (Transportation of Natural and Other Gas by Pipeline) of the Code of Federal Regulations. Maintenance of the electric system is required by CPUC General Order 95, which formulates requirements for overhead electric line maintenance and operation, as well as General Order 167-B, which enforces standards for the maintenance and operation of electric generating facilities.

In 2020, PG&E finalized the Multiple Region O&M Habitat Conservation Plan (MRHCP) and obtained federal take coverage for 36 species throughout the Central Coast, North Coast, and Sacramento Valley and Foothills regions, encompassing 34 counties. This list of 36 species includes giant garter snake, California tiger salamander Central California DPS, foothill yellow-legged frog Feather River DPS, and foothill yellow-legged frog North Sierra DPS, all of which are listed as threatened under CESA. The MRHCP also covers the foothill yellow-legged frog South Sierra DPS, which is listed as endangered under CESA. PG&E proposes to complement its MRHCP by pursuing a long-term ITP from the CDFW for its Covered O&M Activities in CDFW's North Central Region. A long-term ITP and MSAA would provide an enhanced conservation strategy, ensure compliance with CESA, and reduce the administrative burden involved in processing project-by-project state ITPs and Lake and Streambed Alteration Agreements.

The ITP application was submitted to the CDFW on June 26, 2024 and was subsequently deemed complete on July 26, 2024. The long-term ITP application includes proposed authorization of incidental take of three threatened species—giant garter snake, California tiger salamander, and the Feather River and North Sierra DPSs of foothill yellow-frog—as well as one endangered species—foothill yellow-legged frog South Sierra DPS—during routine Covered O&M Activities in the Permit Area. Issuance of the ITP is the discretionary action that has triggered the preparation of an EIR in accordance with CEQA. The ITP, if issued, would authorize Proposed Project-related incidental take of giant garter snake, California tiger salamander, and three foothill yellow-legged frog DPSs (i.e., the Feather River, North Sierra, and South Sierra DPSs) subject to certain conditions under the CESA.

PG&E intends to develop an MSAA in partnership with the CDFW for certain Covered O&M Activities that may occur within the bed, bank, or channel of rivers, streams, or lakes to ensure compliance with the CDFW's Lake and Streambed Alteration Program (the "LSA Program") and California Fish and Game Code Section 1602.

B.2 Permit Area

The Permit Area encompasses PG&E's natural gas and electric facilities in CDFW's North Central Region of California as depicted in Figure 1: Permit Area Overview Map. The Covered O&M Activities in CDFW's North Central Region would occur in the following 15 counties: Amador, Butte, Calaveras, Colusa, El Dorado, Glenn, Lake, Nevada, Placer, Plumas, Sacramento (east of I-5), Sierra, Sutter, Yolo (north of I-80), and Yuba counties, totaling approximately 10,162,133 acres (7,420,043 acres of which are in natural vegetation). All of the Covered O&M Activities would occur within the following types of areas, all of which will be analyzed in the EIR:

- PG&E gas and electrical transmission and distribution rights-of-way (ROWs) and lands where PG&E has other relevant land rights;
- the lands owned by PG&E in fee;
- access routes associated with PG&E's routine maintenance;
- a buffer around the ROW; and
- mitigation areas acquired to compensate for impacts resulting from the Covered O&M Activities.

C. Project Description

The Proposed Project involves O&M activities within CDFW's North Central Region, which encompasses approximately 35,000 miles of combined natural gas and electric facilities. The gas transmission system consists of gas distribution pipelines and ROWs extending from 5 feet to 150 feet wide. The electric transmission system consists of transmission lines supported by lattice towers or poles, substations, and ROWs that vary in width, according to the system voltage, terrain, the number of lines per ROW and other factors. The proposed Covered O&M Activities include specific outlined O&M activities for both natural gas and electric facilities, as follows:

- Maintenance tasks associated with Covered O&M Activities for both natural gas and electric facility O&M: Activities include those related to Proposed Project road access; staging large vehicles, equipment, or materials; clearing vegetation and/or obstacles to safely conduct maintenance or construction; grading to create flat working surfaces for large Covered O&M Activities; erosion control to observe best management practices; trenching and excavating; crossing; cleanup and restoration; incidental vegetation removal necessary to complete Covered O&M Activities; and emergency work.
- Natural Gas Covered O&M Activities: Activities include repair, replacement and maintenance, protective measures, and upgrades to pipelines and associated facilities.
- Electric System Covered O&M Activities: Activities include replacement, repair, and maintenance of electric towers and poles, access boardwalks, and equipment; line reconductoring; and upgrades or expansions to facilities.
- Other Covered O&M Activities: Activities include those associated with biological monitoring, surveying, and handling, and management of land purchased or conserved for mitigation.

In general, routine Covered O&M Activities would result in temporary disturbance in areas already previously disturbed, such as along existing ROWs and existing access roads. The majority of the Covered O&M Activities in the Permit Area would result in temporary and short-term impacts to expose the natural gas and/or electric facilities for inspection or repair, or to access a given facility. The Covered O&M Activities proposed would not result in large new permanent disturbance areas.

O&M activities have been conducted for the pipeline and electric systems for decades and PG&E expects the same Covered O&M Activities would continue at a similar frequency. Therefore, the type, number, and frequency of ongoing Covered O&M Activities would continue to be a part of the baseline conditions in the Permit Area. The amount of ground disturbance would vary each year depending on the type and number of Covered O&M Activities scheduled. Table 1: Estimated Impacts from Covered O&M Activities details the estimated loss and take for each species.

PG&E would perform all Covered O&M Activities in accordance with federal, state, and local environmental, safety, and construction regulations and standards. Where applicable, PG&E would also conduct the work in accordance with landowner agreements. Typical Covered O&M Activities, as well as the typical area of disturbance, duration, and frequency of activities in the Permit Area are presented in Table 2: Summary of Covered O&M Activities.

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As previously discussed, PG&E intends to develop a MSAA in partnership with the CDFW for certain Covered O&M Activities that may occur within the bed, bank, or channel of rivers, streams, or lakes to ensure compliance with the CDFW's LSA Program and California Fish and Game Code Section 1602. PG&E is including a subset of Covered O&M Activities in the MSAA that may necessitate notification through CDFW's LSA Program when those activities have the potential to result in impacts to CDFW-jurisdictional waters.

The Covered O&M Activities proposed for inclusion in the submitted MSAA notification include:

- the gas and electric access road maintenance program;
- gas and electric temporary crossings for access;
- the vegetation management/maintenance program;
- erosion control solutions; and
- · certain gas and electric O&M activities as described herein.

The measures specified for Covered O&M Activities in the submitted MSAA notification include:

- Best Management Practices for erosion control and sedimentation associated with stormwater, for applicable Covered O&M Activities;
- relevant Field Protocols and wetland-specific Avoidance and Mitigation Measures included in PG&E's MRHCP; and
- additional avoidance and minimization measures proposed by PG&E hereafter called applicant-proposed measures (APMs) that will be identified in the EIR and will be implemented for Covered O&M Activities requiring coverage under the ITP and/or MSAA.

D. Potential Environmental Effects

Pursuant to CEQA Guidelines Section 15063(a), the CDFW has elected to proceed with the preparation of a Draft EIR. After conducting a significance determination, the following sections were deemed to have no impact and will not be included in the Draft EIR: Mineral Resources, Population and Housing, and Public Services. The impacts analysis in the EIR will be conducted in accordance with the CEQA Guidelines and will provide a response to each threshold question that can be found in Appendix G, Environmental Checklist Form. This link is provided to assist the public and agencies in preparing written scoping comments.

The EIR will evaluate potential environmental effects of the Proposed Project, including PG&E's best management and standard practices, as well as APMs, during the environmental evaluation. Where needed, mitigation measures will be proposed to avoid and/or substantially lessen any significant adverse effects identified in the EIR's impact analysis.

The EIR will also address the cumulative environmental consequences of the Proposed Project in combination with other closely related past, present, and reasonably foreseeable future projects in the area. This will serve to satisfy CEQA requirements regarding regional cumulative effect concerns.

In compliance with CEQA Guidelines Section 15126.6, the EIR will describe and evaluate the comparative merits of a reasonable range of alternatives to the Proposed Project. The EIR will also identity any alternatives that were considered but rejected by the lead agency as infeasible and briefly explain the reasoning. The EIR will provide an analysis of the no project alternative and will also identify the environmentally superior alternative. The alternatives to be analyzed in the EIR will be developed during the environmental review process and will consider input received during public scoping.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE ACTION TO AUTHORIZE THE INTERIM CITY MANAGER TO EXECUTE AN AGREEMENT WITH BELFORD PROPERTY RESTORATION FOR RESTORATION AND INVENTORY OF CONTAMINATED CITY RECORDS

BACKGROUND

During a recent search for historical wastewater-related records, staff located decades of City documents stored in a portable building located near the Wastewater Treatment Plant. Upon inspection, it was determined that the structure had deteriorated over time, allowing water intrusion and rodent infestation. As a result, the majority of the stored records have been compromised by moisture, mold, and rodent damage.

To assess the condition and determine possible recovery options, staff contacted Belfor Property Restoration, a firm specializing in document restoration and contamination mitigation. Following an on-site evaluation, Belfor concluded that most records are unlikely to be fully salvageable due to the extent of the damage. However, the company recommended cleaning, limited decontamination, and inventorying of the materials to prevent additional deterioration and ensure safe handling.

Even after the cleaning process, access to these materials will still require proper safety precautions, including the use of N95 masks and gloves, due to residual contamination concerns.

FISCAL IMPACT

The cost of services from Belfor Property Restoration is estimated between \$4,700 and \$6,350, depending on the final scope of work.

BACKGROUND

Throughout the years, the City has supported the Challenge of Champions Rodeo which is a California High School Rodeo Association event. The event will take place at the Amador County Fair Grounds March 20-22, 2026. The high school rodeo contestants are the top three qualifiers in their event from the nine districts in California. In the years of 2023, 2024, and 2025, the City has granted \$15,000 each year to support the rodeo. The Challenge of Champions Rodeo is asking for a TOT grant of \$15,000 for the 2026 event.

FISCAL IMPACT

The fiscal impact is \$15,000 dollars from our Transient Occupancy Tax fund. The TOT Streets & Promotions has appropriated \$40,000 for FY 25/26 to promote all events throughout the City.

The Challenge of Champions Rodeo has provided an estimated economic impact formula from the American Quarter Horse Association (AQHA) from the organizers that is based on data from the Fort Worth Texas Chamber of Commerce which does not necessarily apply equally to California or the City of Plymouth

The City receives approximately one cent (\$0.01) from every dollar spent within our city limits out of the 7.75% sales tax as we do not have a special tax assessed for the City. The City has recently experienced a significant decline in available TOT revenue collected.

The high school rodeo contestants participating in the Challenge of Champions Rodeo are the top three qualifiers in their event from the nine districts in California. These young people are so inspiring as the program was created by an educator who saw the potential in rodeo to help develop character, sportsmanship and academic achievement resulting in good citizens.

To maintain the quality of the Challenge of Champions delivered in the past and in lieu of continually rising costs we request financial assistance from the City of Plymouth. Our community support has made it possible to ensure that this event stays here as I have defended multiple attempts in the past to have it moved to other venues. For our 2026 rodeo we are asking for \$15,000 again as we have been awarded \$15,000 each for 2023,2024, and 2025. There is definitely a financial advantage for this community to have the Challenge of Champions held here and with difficulty establishing exact benefit amounts we can defer to the formula included in the packet that the American Quarter Horse Association has published. If you apply the formula with 300 horses and using a 4 day occupancy the sum would easily return the \$15000 and much much more. The City of Plymouth has been a most important partner for the success of this event.

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How to Calculate an Event's Economic Impact

To figure the economic impact of your show on the surrounding area, the following formula can be used:

(Actual number of horses X 3 people per horse = total people) X (Actual show days + 1 move-in/-out days X \$150 per diem = total \$) = \$ directly into city.

Then, multiply \$\\$ directly into city by 2 (estimated number of times each tourist dollar turns over in the economy) = total economic impact.

SAMPLE Two-Day Show

(70 actual horses X 3 people per horse = 210 people) X (2 actual show days + 1 move-in/-out days X \$150 per diem = \$450) = \$94,500

\$94,500 X 2 = \$189,000 total economic impact on community.

History of This Formula

This formula originally was developed by the American Quarter Horse Association in conjunction with the Fort Worth Texas Chamber of Commerce utilizing a multiplier effect of seven (7). Several years ago, that multiplier was revised to four (4), and two years ago it was revised to two (2) based on advice from various economists that it's only feasible to trace a dollar two times in a given economy.

Additional modifications have been made (2.5 people/horse to 3 people/horse and a per diem increase for inflation from \$140 to \$150/day).

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE ACTION TO DELEGATE AUTHORITY TO THE INTERIM CITY MANAGER TO EXECUTE CONTRACTS ALLOWING SEPTAGE DISPOSAL AT THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT

BACKGROUND

The City of Plymouth operates a state-permitted Wastewater Treatment Plant ("WWTP") that processes municipal wastewater. While many parts of the City's infrastructure are stressed, the city's WWTP has excess processing capacity available. Several septic haulers operating in and around the City have recently expressed interest in utilizing the WWTP for the disposal of domestic septage collected from private septic systems.

Staff is proposing to accept and charge haulers on a per-load, volumetric basis. Offering this service on this per-load, volumetric basis maintains maximum flexibility for the City and allows the City to discontinue service for any reason at any time, if, for example the capacity is needed to treat sewage from new service connections to the City's sewer collection system. Allowing this activity would provide a service that supports proper wastewater management and environmental protection while generating additional revenue for the City. While several haulers have expressed interest, there is no predictable revenue stream that would be generated by this opportunity though it would enable the city to generate revenue from existing capacity in the WWTP.

To ensure consistency and accountability across haulers, staff has developed a standardized contract template that outlines disposal procedures, fees, permitted waste types, and compliance requirements. Each hauler seeking to use this service

would be required to sign an agreement with the City prior to the City accepting any septage from them at the WWTP.

FISCAL IMPACT

Staff does not have any precise projections as to how much revenue this service will generate for the City. Offering this service will not incur additional costs to the City as no additional staffing is required at this time, and existing plant personnel will manage intake and monitoring within current workloads and schedules.

RECOMMENDATION

Delegate authority to the Interim City Manager to execute contracts with licensed septic companies, in a form substantially similar to the template agreement attached hereto, allowing licensed septic companies to dispose of septage at the Plymouth Wastewater Treatment Plant.
