Veterans Day Did you know...?

Veterans day memorializes the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month of 1918 when an armistice was signed and marked the beginning of the end of World War 1. For this reason, "Veterans Day" use to go by the name "Armistice Day", until President Eisenhower changed it in 1954. Raymond Weeks, a World War II Navy Veteran, is known as "The Father of Veterans Day".

After serving, Weeks returned home to Birmingham, Alabama and committed himself to advocating and petitioning for a day to celebrate ALL veterans, not just those who served in WWI. Because of him, Birmingham held the first ever "Veterans Day" celebration in 1947.

As of 2025, there are 17.6 million veterans in the US. They make up around 6% of the American adult population, with the largest proportion of living US veterans belonging to the Gulf War Era. Approximately, 181,510 Americans enlisted in the US military as a response to the attacks of 9/11/2001- an 8% rise in enlistment compared to the previous year. Veterans are ~ 1.5 times more likely to join STEM occupations than non-veterans. Veterans often possess unique technical, problem-solving, and leadership skills and adaptability that are well-suited for careers in STEM.



THANKSGIVING PET FOOD SAFETY

Things your pets CAN eat:

Unseasoned, skinless, boneless Turkey meat (cooked Turkey bones splinter easily, so be careful when feeding turkey to your pets!) Seedless Cranberries and Apples 100% Pumpkin Puree Plain Green Beans, Peas, and Carrots. Sweet potatoes are good in moderation.

Things your pets SHOULD NOT eat:

Sugary Sweets and Chocolate
Xylitol: An artificial sweetener, namely found
in sugar-free treats and some peanut butters
Fatty Foods like Ham, Mash Potatoes,
Graw, and Stuffing

- No bags greens must be removed from bags before disposal into containers.

We will not be accepting trash or refrigerator-freezers at this event. Only the items listed above.
